

Key considerations for your hotel

Before exploring whether outsourced or in-house is right for your operation, it's worth taking the time to think about your existing processes. Here are some of the factors to consider while planning, budgeting for and managing laundry from day to day.



Your hotel's location, size, type and rating

A four-star hotel near the coast is likely to clean more beach towels. A motorway hotel would experience a high guest turnover and launder high volumes of bed sheets. A boutique hotel is likely to prioritise the quality of its linen. A spa hotel's guests will expect fluffy towels on tap. But it's not just about responding to your guests' needs.

When it comes to laundry outsourcing, a rural hotel will probably face more logistical challenges than a well-connected urban venue, and you'll also need to consider staff resources: does your team have the time to carry out daily laundry duties?

Managing the risks of contamination and infection control

Given the regular turnover of guests and visitors to your hotel, hygiene is crucial, and your laundry process is one of the main ways you'll maintain it. It's why, just as in care homes and hospitals, it's important that your contaminated items can be kept separate from freshly laundered items, and that you're able to maintain 'dirty' and 'clean' laundry zones.

The layout of your building

Having enough space is one of the basics of operating on-premises laundry facility, while the location, size and shape of the space will also dictate the kind of washing machines, tumble dryers and professional irons you use on site. You'll also want to look at access requirements (e.g., a ground floor laundry is simpler to service).

If you can operate a larger laundry room, you may be able to invest in larger pieces of equipment – such as ironers – and, in turn, handle even more processes on site. If you think you're more likely to have a smaller laundry room, you might look instead at space-saving or stackable laundry equipment.

Transportation and processing

Efficient transport and processing workflows are crucial for saving time, maintaining guest satisfaction, and minimising the risks of cross-contamination. You'll want to be sure that any soiled items can be transported to your laundry facility as quickly as possible, and that changeovers can be completed with maximum efficiency to avoid any disruption to guests.

Many commercial laundries enforce minimum order volumes, which are often unsuitable for smaller and medium-sized hospitality businesses. To counteract this, some hotels often store up dirty laundry until it reaches a certain threshold, which is not best practice for hygiene, and often takes up precious space.

In-house towel laundries – the best of both worlds?

Rather than bringing all laundry processes back in-house at once, some hotels opt for a staged approach, particularly if space is restricted. By focusing on towels as a first step, hotels can still achieve immediate benefits with minimal hassle:

When up to half of a hotel's laundry costs are taken up by cleaning towels, there are significant savings to be made

Stacked machines take up minimal space and maximise laundry output for constant rotation, ideal for even the busiest hotel

Towel laundry rooms require minimal staff training or specialist equipment, and can noticeably improve finish quality – a large impact with minimal disruption. Given towels don't require ironing then it is a much simpler task compared to bed linen.

Types of laundry equipment

As with any big investment, it's crucial that your laundry room is set up for the future. So, beyond room placement and layout, it's important to consider the right commercial machines to invest in. Here's an overview of the equipment you'll need.

Stackable laundry machines

Stackable commercial washing machines and dryers will save you space in your laundry room and solve problems associated with limited square footage. These compact tumble dryers and washing machines also help to reduce wash-dry times – helpful in large hotels where linen is washed at high volumes.

Available in washer/dryer and dryer/dryer combinations, stackable machines are just as efficient and cost-effective as singular machines, and allow you to cope with extra throughput without having to change your existing layout.



The staple for larger hotels and spas demanding capacity for larger laundry throughputs, industrial washers thrive in even the most demanding laundry rooms and can turn over big loads at frequency. Some of the largest industrial washing machines on the market offer capacities up to 220kg.

Commercial ironers

Larger hotels with a full in-house laundry facility will often make use of commercial ironing equipment, particularly dryerironers and rotary irons. These fast, efficient and versatile machines help to achieve a professional finish while reducing labour costs and freeing up staff to concentrate on other tasks.







Alternatives to traditional washing machines

Ozone-powered disinfection technology uses the natural power of ozone to destroy moulds, yeasts, viruses and bacteria, even on a cold wash. This safe and gentle process offers a real alternative to thermal disinfection, and could cut running costs by up to 50% while increasing the life of your laundry items.
